

1779-1783 Fort George Protected by the Crown

After the British victory at Fort George (Penobscot Expedition. 1779). Castine became a safe haven for the Scottish and Hessian troops and the Loyalists who flocked there from other parts of New England. The Fort was continuously reinforced as the British assumed the Penobscot River would become the border between the inevitable United States of America and British North America. Fort George was vacated by the crown troops in 1783 when John Adams proved that the whole Maine Province was a part of Massachusetts, and therefore part of the new United States of America.
